# Shelter-in-Place

**Shelter-in-Place** means to stay indoors because it is safer than being outside or leaving your location (home, work or school) due to harmful chemicals in the air.

## When should I use shelter-in-place?

- When there is little time to react to a situation and it is too dangerous to be outside.
- When life-threatening agents are in the air, for example chemical spills and hazardous materials.

## If Disaster Strikes:

- Remain calm
- Don't decide to leave your home or town if you are not told to do so
- Listen to the radio, TV and base notification systems for announcements
- If told to leave, do so right away
- Follow designated routes because short cuts may not be available
- When you get to a safe area, listen to radio or TV for updates



## How do I shelter-in-place?

- Build a supply kit NOW to include; plastic sheeting that is thicker & heavier than plastic wrap (10 mil/0.01inch) and duct tape


### Once Notified:

1. Bring your children and pets indoors right away.
2. Close and lock all windows and outside doors.
3. Turn off all fans, heating and air conditioning systems. This may make your home uncomfortable, but it will reduce the chance of exposure to chemical or biological agents outside which can cause illness and even death.
4. If you have a fireplace, close it.
5. Go to a small, interior room with the fewest windows (such as a bathroom) and stay there.
6. Using the supply kit plastic sheeting and duct tape, cover and seal windows, cracks, vents and doors. (As shown below)
7. Keep listening to the radio from your supply kit until you are notified that it is safe to leave or evacuate.



## Supply Kit:

- Bottled water and food that comes in easy-to-open cans or pop-top containers (at least a one day supply)
- Prescription medication for a week and paper copies of prescriptions
- First aid kit
- Warm clothes, blankets, rain gear, shoes and hats
- An extra pair of glasses and/or hearing aid
- Personnel hygiene items
- Plastic sheeting that is thicker than plastic wrap (10 mil/0.01 inch)
- Plastic garbage bags for waste
- Dust masks
- Items for family members with special needs
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- Battery operated radio with extra batteries
- Pocket knife
- Whistle and pepper spray
- Extra house and car keys
- Paper and pens
- Family communications plan with emergency phone numbers
- Road maps
- Credit and debit cards along with small amounts of cash, coin and checks
- Copies of important documents such as identification, passports, home and auto insurance information, account numbers all stored in a waterproof folder/bag
- A recent family photo and pictures of your pets
