TO: 633d Air Base Wing

1. Effective the date of this letter, the attached emblem is approved in accordance with AFR 900-3.

2. This correspondence and attachments are permanent records and will be retained by the unit commander and, where applicable, by the parent unit historian, until the unit prepares for inactivation. Instructions for disposition of the file are printed on the emblem folder. If requesting unit is unable to obtain local reproduction for additional prints, contact the wing, command, or this headquarters.

3. Unit designations are not placed on the scrolls of emblem paintings or photographs because unit designations are subject to change. You may place your current unit designation on the scroll of all emblem reproductions. Lettering for MAJCOMs, SOAs, and DRUs is Air Force yellow, edged golden brown. Lettering for all other flag-bearing units is ultra-marine blue. The flag drawing, on the other hand, necessarily instructs the flag maker on the abbreviation of your current designation that will best fit the space available in the scroll. If your designation changes, you should request a new flag drawing.

4. Units will use local supply procedures to obtain decals, uniform patches, organizational flags, and other emblem facsimiles and reproductions. See AFM 67-1, Vol I, for procuring patches and AFM 67-1, Vol IV, for procuring flags.

EMBLEM. Description. Per pile abase azure and vert, in chief a stylized cloud formation fesswise argent, emitting from its base two lightning flashes chevronwise to base or, within the lightning flashes a crossbow palewise gules with drawstring and arrow or, on the base 16 bamboo rods palewise of the like, all within a diminished bordure of the last. Significance. The emblem is symbolic of the unit, and the Air Force colors, golden yellow and ultramarine blue, are used. The color blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air force operations, and yellow to the excellence of Air Force personnel in assigned duties. Emanating and descending diagonally from the cloud (signifying "Flying Clouds") are lighting bolts, traditional symbol of the might of the Air Force, which strike back a bamboo curtain, depicting aggressiveness. In the rift of the curtain is a red cross bow, symbolic of the unit's fighting ability. Motto. BONUM BONO ACCUMULATE -- Accumulate Good upon Good. Approved on 8 Nov 1967. ## 633d AIR BASE GROUP

### BLAZON

Azure, in chief a stylized cloud formation fesswise argent (gray) emitting from its base, two lightning flashes chevronwise or, within the lightning flashes, a crossbow palewise, gules with drawstring and bolt or, all within a diminished bordure of the last.

### SIGNIFICANCE

Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The lightning flashes emanating from the clouds reflect the power and force of the Air Force mission which the Wing supports. The crossbow symbolizes the Wing's aircraft and their weapons systems and indicates the technological training of the unit personnel.



### SIGNIFICANCE

Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The eagle represents military preparedness and the vigilance of the Squadron's combat-proven air base ground defense forces. The crossed pistols signify the unit's heritage of military police service. The yellow, red and green bar represents the Vietnam campaign ribbon. The bar with one silver and three bronze stars reflects the nine campaigns in which the Squadron participated during the Vietnam War.

**OPERATIONS.** Operating from Andersen AFB, Guam, and with detachments at Yokota, Japan, at Kadena, Okinawa, and at Camp H. M. Smith, Hawaii, the 27th installed, operated, and maintained teletype, telephoto, radio, and telephone facilities in support of the 3d Air Division (Strategic Air Command). Escalating U.S. air operations in Southeast Asia in the mid-1960s required a larger and more sophisticated communications network in that area. To meet this demand, the 27th Communications Squadron established new operating locations in the Philippine Islands, South Vietnam, Thailand, South Korea, and Japan. ARC LIGHT, BULLET SHOT, and LINBACKER operations of 3d Air Division, and, later, of Eighth Air Force, made the 27th the busiest communications unit in SAC. When operations in Southeast Asia drew down in the 1970s, the 27th had considerably broadened its communications capabilities and expanded its network to include more than a million square miles of the Pacific. In mid-1976 this network became a part of the Air Force Communications Command.

EMBLEM. Description. Over a disc white, edged Air Force blue, two lightning flashes red, in a "V" shaped formation. 

ARGENT AIR FORCE WINGS ARE POSITIONED ON THE OR FIELD AT DEXTER CHIEF. AN OR LIGHTNING BOLT IS PLACED AT SINISTER CHIEF. A PAIR OF OR HANDS ARE AT DEXTER BASE, WHILE AN ARGENT BOMB IS SURMOUNTED BY A SABLE WRENCH AT SINISTER BASE. THE DISC IS BORDERED WITH SABLE. TWO ULTRAMARINE AZURE SCROLLS ARE ATTACHED ABOVE AND BELOW THE DISC. THE SCROLL ABOVE IS LETTERED WITH ARGENT AND BEARS THE UNIT'S MOTTO "WITH CONCERN FOR ALL." THE SCROLL BELOW IS BLANK.

### **SIGNIFICANCE**

ULTRAMARINE BLUE AND AIR FORCE YELLOW ARE USED IN THE DESIGN. BLUE REPRESENTS THE SKY, THE PRIMARY THEATER OF AIR FORCE OPERATIONS. YELLOW SIGNIFIES THE SUN AND THE EXCELLENCE REQUIRED OF AIR FORCE PERSONNEL. THE WINGS SYMBOLIZE THOSE WHO FLY AND FIGHT. THE LIGHTNING BOLT IS INDICATIVE OF THE QUICK RESPONSE OF OUR FORCES WHICH WILL ENSURE THE AIR FORCE MISSION OF DETERRENCE. THE HANDS SIGNIFY THE HELPING HANDS OF OUR PEOPLE. THE BOMB AND WRENCH REPRESENT THOSE WHO MAINTAIN THE AIRCRAFT AND THE ARMAMENT.

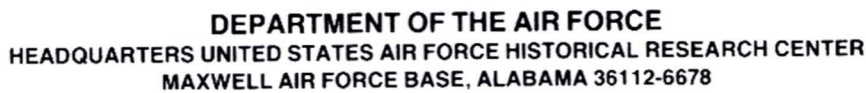
