

Furniture

Furniture issued by the government and in serviceable condition must be turned into DLA in Norfolk, VA. Damaged wooden furniture can be placed in the designated scrap wood containers.

Oil & Antifreeze

Motor oil and antifreeze must be taken to an automotive shop in order to be disposed of/recycled.

Batteries

-Lead acid-batteries should not be placed in dumpsters or containers they are recycled by turning them into facilities (i.e. auto parts store; Battery Plus) or stores that sell them.

-Alkaline batteries should be thrown in the regular trash.

-Lithium, nickel-cadmium, and mercury batteries are to be treated as *universal waste*. Separate them into different containers and place a label on them identifying that container or turn them in to Battery Plus or Battery Outlet.

Recycling Program

Overview

In order to promote pollution prevention, JBLE-Langley utilizes a program that incorporates reduction, recycling, composting, energy recovery (incineration), and land filling. Recycling is a program encouraged base wide with a specific area at each facility meant as a collection area for most recyclables. Other facilities such as the scrap yard and Defense Logistics Agency-Disposition Services are available to aid in the recycling of materials that cannot be put into the collection bins.



Commingled Materials

Materials such as newspapers, colored paper, magazines, plastics, cans and glass (clear, brown, and green) can be placed into the same container. A container is located in the facility's recycling area where the contractor will collect them weekly.

White Office Paper

Containers are placed in each facility's recycling areas meant specifically for white office paper only. Shredded office paper must be put in a clear plastic bag. Contractors collect these every other week.

Ink Cartridges

Printer toner cartridges are to be placed in a clear plastic bag, tied off, and placed *next* to (not inside) the white office paper container in the facility's recycling area.

Cardboard

Cardboard has its own separate bins. These bins are beige and are usually found by dumpsters. Breakdown the boxes before placing them in the bin and do not place food cardboard (i.e. pizza boxes) in the container.

Wood

Serviceable wooden pallets can be taken to the recycling center (scrap yard) to be recycled (M, W, F 1300-1500). Unusable wood can be placed in the roll off bins located around base to be recycled.

Metal

All types of metal are acceptable for recycling on base at the Langley Recycling Center (scrap yard) by Building 330. It is open on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 1300-1500. Any liquids such as oils or refrigerants should be *removed* prior to dropping it off.

E-Waste

Electronics such as TVs and computer monitors should be turned into Defense Logistics Agency- Disposition Services (DLA). If the appliance is still in good working condition, it may also be donated to organizations such as Good Will or the Salvation Army. If the screens to these devices are broken, treat them as hazardous waste.

C & D Debris

These are materials resulting from construction and demolition. Materials that fall under this category include: wood, drywall, plastics, roofing, rubble, brick and glass. The contractors performing the task are responsible for the management and removal of these materials. Any material that is not recycled is disposed of at the Bethel Sanitary Landfill.

Note: Please only place 3 printer cartridges in the clear plastic bag
